From the Principal

Semester One was dedicated to the celebration of our 65th anniversary year, being Canberra's oldest continuing Catholic school. We have much to be proud of as a College and as a community, and we have celebrated this through two key events in Semester One.

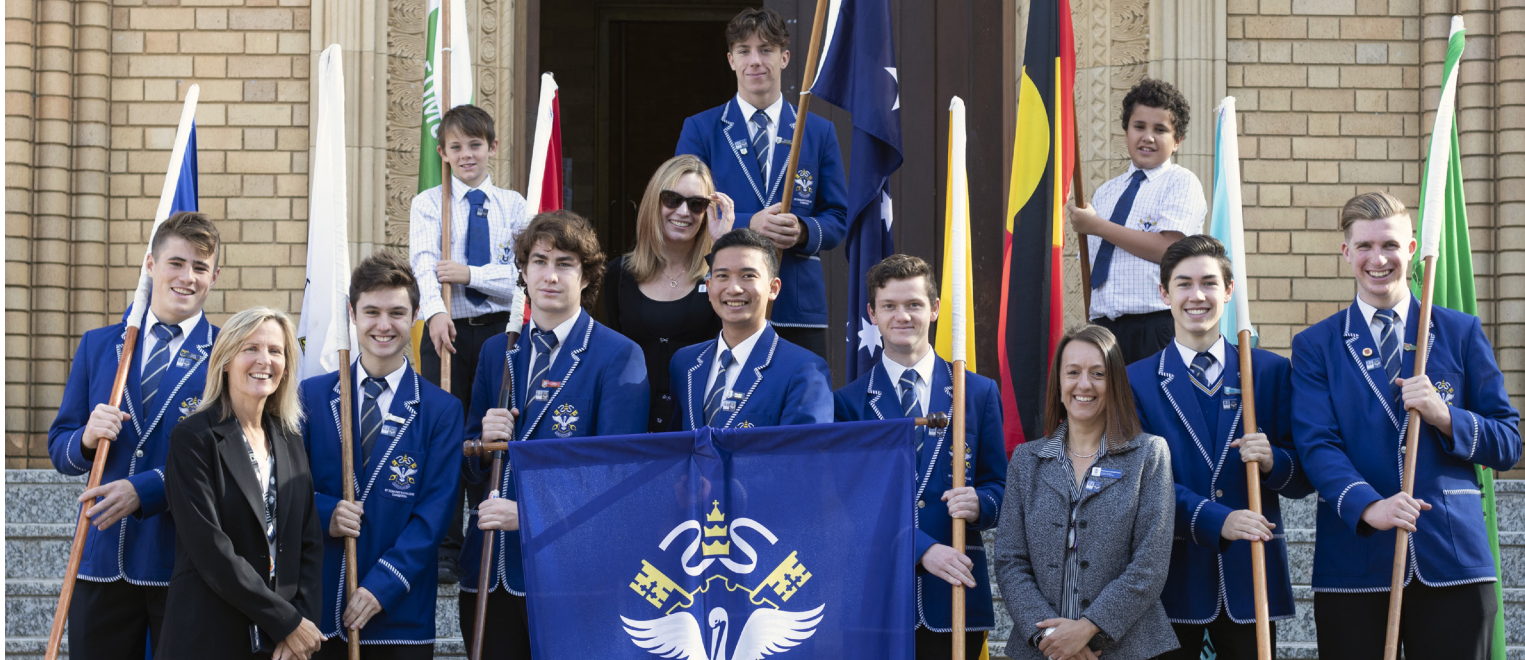
and a special mention to former member of staff Mr Frank Hansby who had provided a service of 32 years by the time he retired in 2017.

The Mass was followed by an afternoon of market stalls and activities back at the College. There was a festive feeling in the air as our boys tried their hand at a number of games and filled their tastebuds with hot dogs, chips, sausage sizzles and the like. The day culminated in the House Tug-o-war which was won by Haydon House. Our 65th anniversary event was made even more memorable by the exemplary behaviour of our boys throughout the day. The boys participated in Mass in a respectful, reverent and graceful manner (and they actually sang!), and this fine behaviour continued back at school. Many staff members commented that this year's Founder's Day was one of the best they have experienced, and this certainly comes down to the positive behaviour, attitude and energy of our students, and the way in which they wholeheartedly participated in all events throughout the day, from morning to afternoon. Our boys really showed the spirit and character of what it is to be an Eddies boy! Our students and staff were presented with a special commemorative 65th anniversary badge to mark the day.

The celebrations continued on Friday, 17 May with the Blue and White Ball, held at the Hellenic Club. This event reflected very strongly and clearly the strong spirit of community we have here at St Edmund's. The number of people attending the ball increased more than 100% from last year, and we had a very large number of old boys attending, including John Barilaro, Deputy Premier of NSW, leader of the Nationals and State Member for Monaro. It was indeed a fabulous night with good food, great music and even greater company. We look forward to the continued success of future Blue and White Balls. A tangible measure of a good school is the strength of its community, as it is the community of a school which forms its culture and identity. 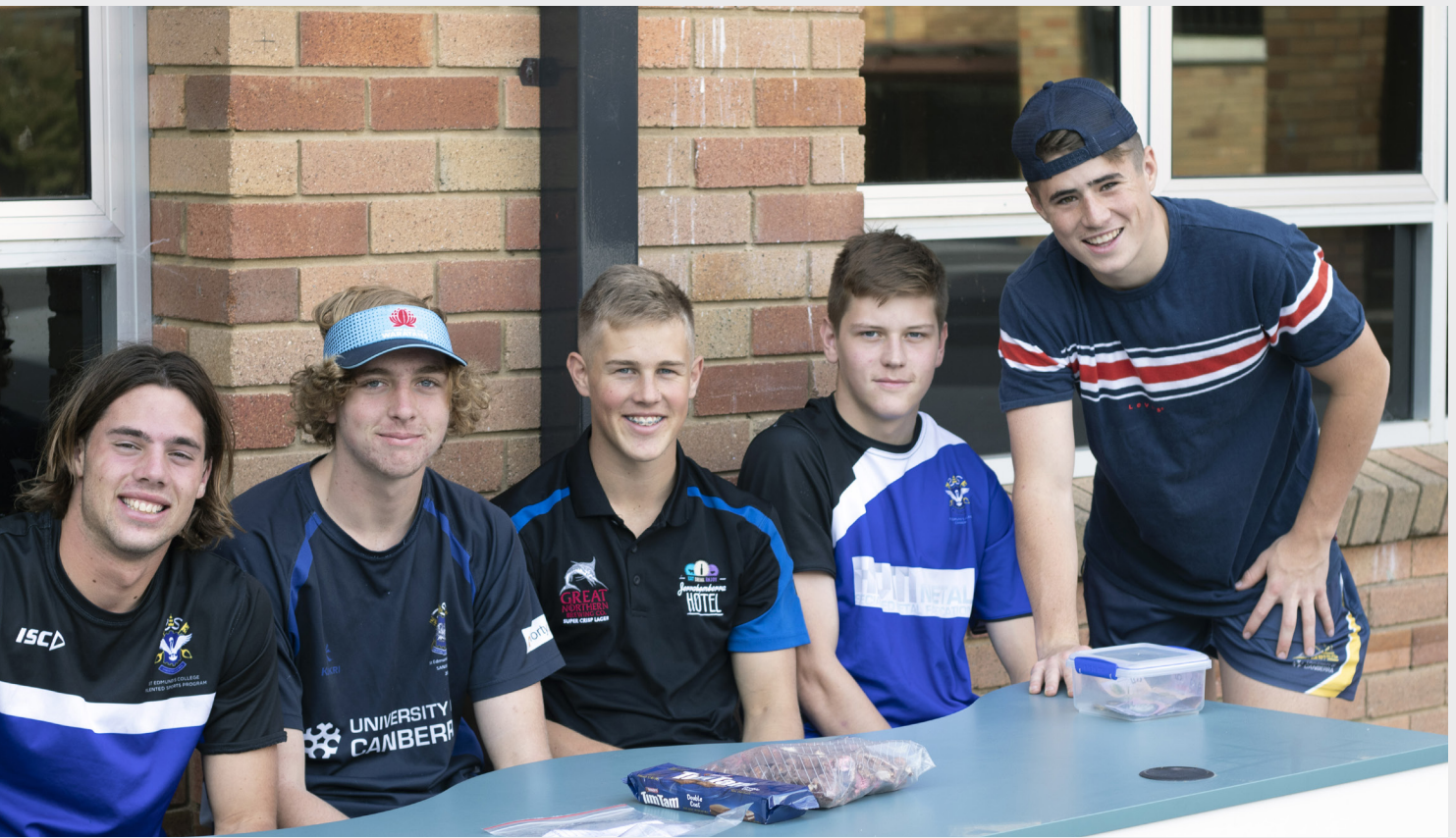

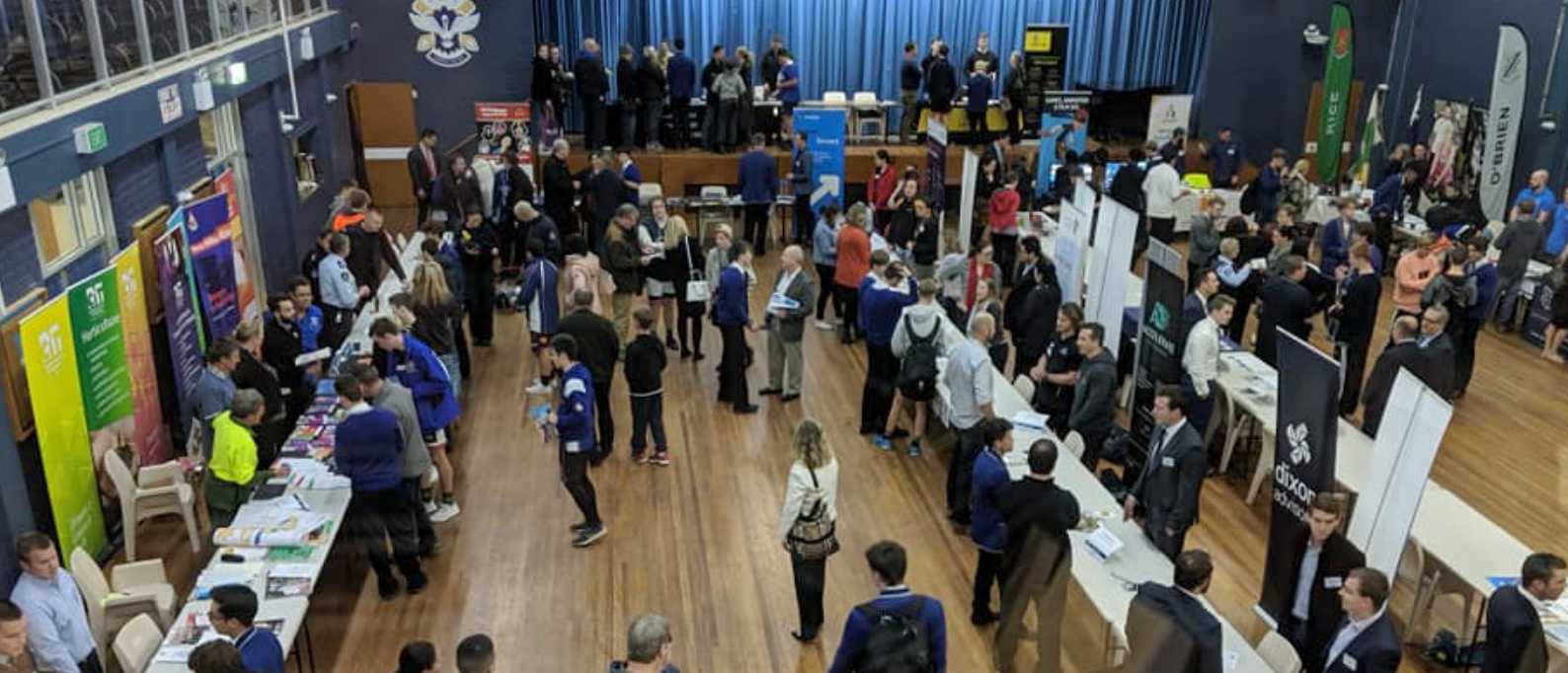

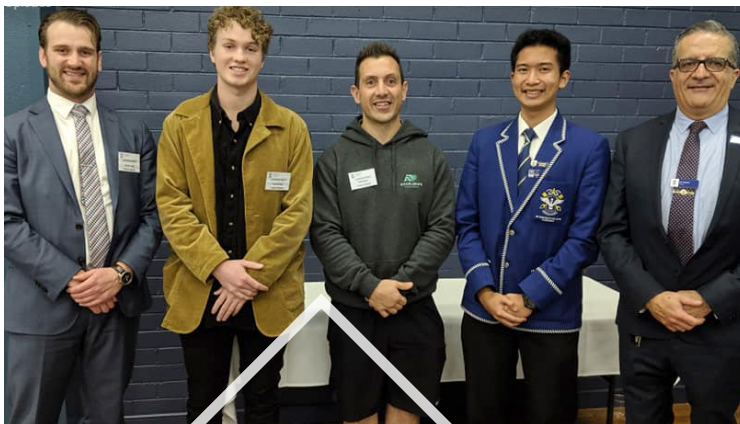
Career Information Night

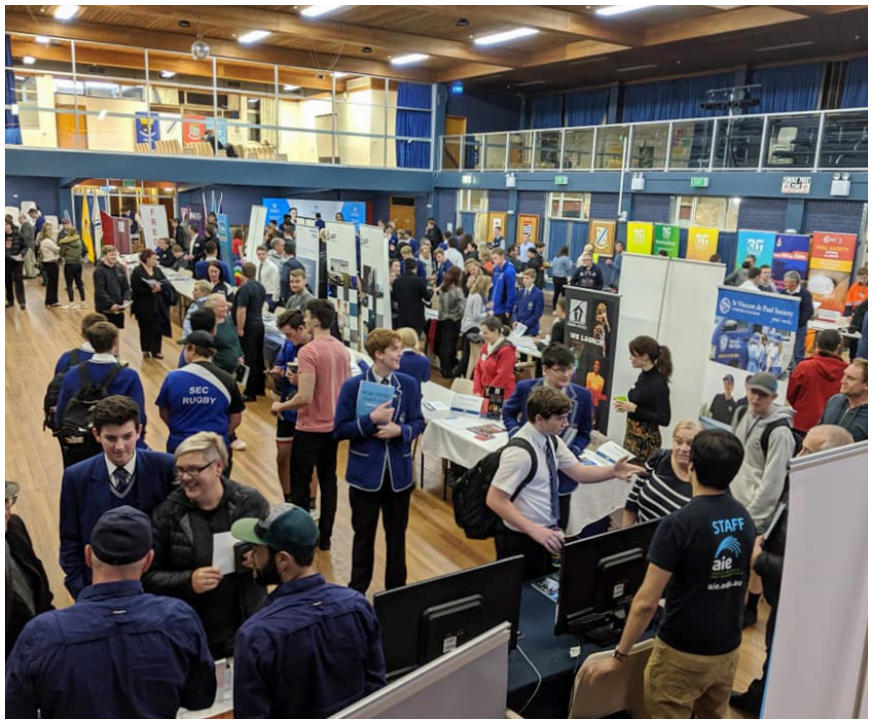
Leigh Southwell Careers Advise

"There is pleasure in the pathless woods. There is rapture on the lonely shore. There is society where none intrudes, by the deep sea and the music in its roar. I love not man the less, but NATURE more"- Lord Byron

In many ways, the above quote by poet, Byron captures the notion and theme for the Year 10 Camp. In essence, the students were challenged to silence the white noise created all too often by the constant connection to electronic devices, escape the busyness of strict schedules that can be suffocating, and to be open to stepping out of their comfort zones to connect with nature, not social media.

There was a level of apprehension from students and staff about heading off to Biloela, an Outdoor Education Group off grid camp ground in the middle of the Belanglo State Forest. We would, for three days have no electricity, showers, flushing toilets and would hike for hours each day to get from destination to destination with all our gear on our backs. All staff and students embraced this opportunity to be at one with nature and to engage with activities like abseiling, kayaking, flying fox, high and low ropes courses and discover how to be self-sufficient in the bush. We learnt about the level of responsibility we have to treasure, to protect our natural environment and wildlife and we discovered that when adversity strikes in the bush, there is not much that determination, perseverance, integrity, trust in your mates and teamwork can't overcome. By the end of our three days, we were all looking forward to having a home cooked meal and a hot shower and had learnt a great deal more about gratitude and appreciation for the finer things in life. We had also realised that a great many of us had a real love of the outdoors and I feel this final quote sums up the feeling of the staff and students beautifully after embarking on such an adventure.

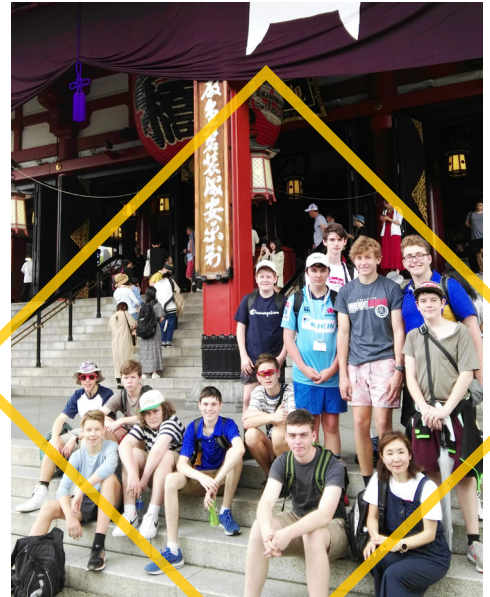

At the first destination, Osaka, the students explored a variety of sightseeing spots: a baseball game at the Osaka Dome and a stRoll in a famous shopping street called Dontonbori, where gaudy, funny merchandise signs mesmerised us all. Despite the teachers' concern over the hot weather at Universal Studio Japan, all students were excellent in looking after themselves and still managed to conquer most of the thrilling rides. Our stay in Osaka was completed with the visit to the Todaiji, the oldest temple in Japan, where we were impressed by the architectural design and structure of the Great Buddha and the statues of the guardians.

Individual students stayed with their homestay family for six days and although the students were nervous prior to the trip, it turned out to be that this homestay period was their highlight of the trip. The students told the teachers every morning about how they shared quality time and received warm hospitality at home.

After leaving Nagasaki and wonderful memories of the people there, we moved to Tokyo. We visited Akihabara which is famous for its electronic shops, Tokyo Sky Tree, and Roppongi, where we crossed the famous multi-intersection.

I would like to thank Mr Taylor, who

assisted with administrative work for the trip and Mr Burke, who volunteered to attend the trip and showed a great deal of care for the students.



Solomon Islands Immersion

Eight students from Years 11 and 12 and Four teachers travelled to Honiara in the Solomon Islands in the July holidays. The purpose for this inaugural trip to the Solomons was to visit Mercy School and redevelop its playground facilities, visit schools in the neighbouring islands (Soso public school, Nugu) and to immerse themselves in the local culture. The students visited Matariau village in West Kola where the boys loved getting a chance to learn a new song and dance with the Sunday School students, as well as distribute hundreds of pencils, books and stationery donated by the St Edmund's College community. The touring party donated over 25 kilos of women's underwear, clothing and medical supplies, as well as cash, to support the Seif Ples Domestic Violence Centre to continue its amazing work in the community.

Some of the tourist highlights that the boys also enjoyed were snorkelling over a WW2 Japanese warship at Mbonege beach, having a guided tour of the USA War Memorial by a former US Marine and exploring the local Art and Craft markets. The boys had to put their culinary skills to the test when challenged by the teachers to cook dinner with produce from the Central Market. They did an incredible job whipping up Chilli tuna risotto, banana chips and lime marinated squid. Their knowledge of the variety of bananas and coconuts in the tropics is now vast.

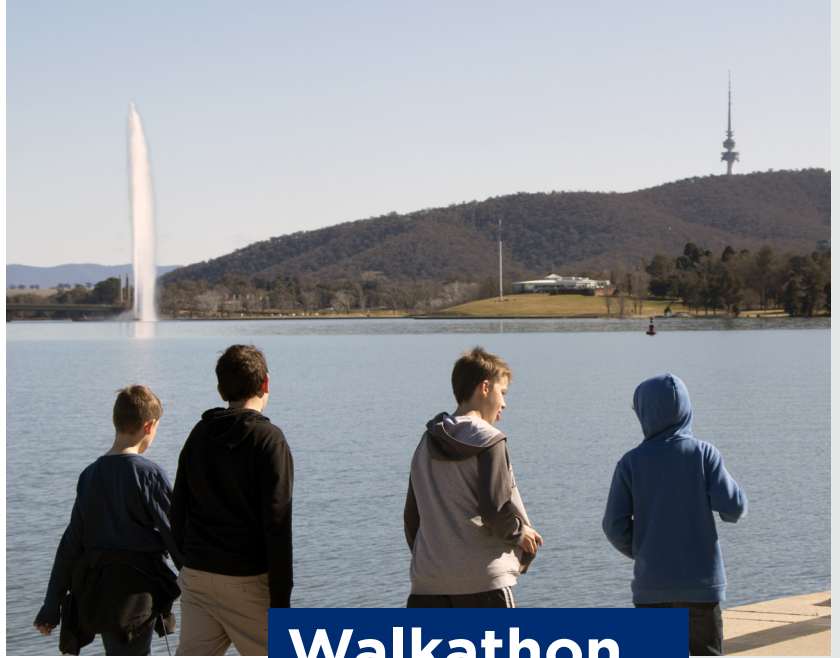
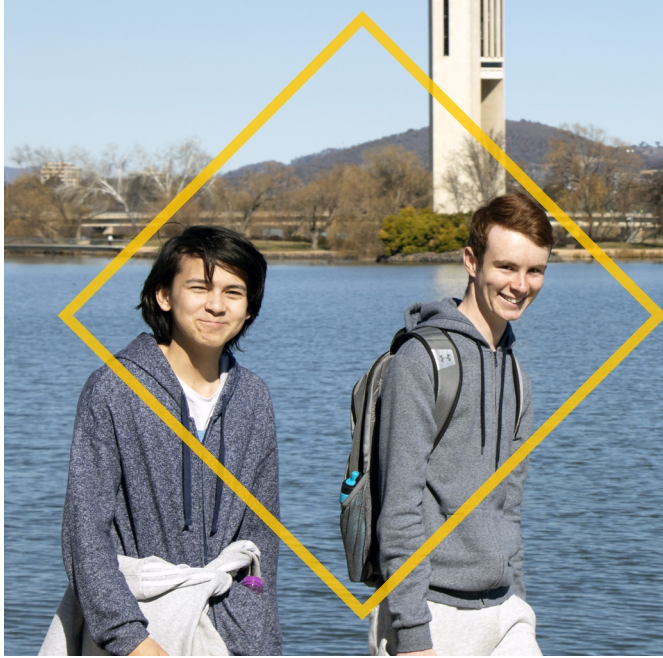
The touring party was warmly welcomed by the communities they visited, they contributed to social and educational development through funds and resources and all of the students and staff absorbed and appreciated the amazing culture of the Solomon islands. St Edmund's College and Mercy School are linked through the Australian- ASIA Education funded BRIDGE program. Last year, Principal Simon Rilaua visited St Edmund's on exchange. St Edmund's College teacher, Leigh Southwell, returned to Honiara after living there in 2014/2015 and constructing classrooms at Mercy School with funding from the "Make A Mark Australia" charity. Again, the charity contributed funds to the playground redevelopment.

But, many students have vowed that they will return one day and they will definitely be welcomed back with open arms by the new friends that they have made.

Travel and immersion into another culture is unquestionably a unique experience for people of any age. For young people, being placed outside of their comfort zone offers many benefits that are otherwise unavailable.

In January, the St Edmund's College Cricket Club commenced its fourth international tour to Sri Lanka. Fourteen students were selected along with Mr. Jacob Knowles, Mr. Jeremy Taylor, Mr. Jason Moore and Mr. Nigel Palfreman to immerse themselves in a culture that lives and breathes the game of cricket.

The tour included five matches against local academy or school teams throughout the country. Competing against different styles of play in diverse facilities enhanced individual and team success amongst the humid conditions Sri Lanka had to offer.

The Pines

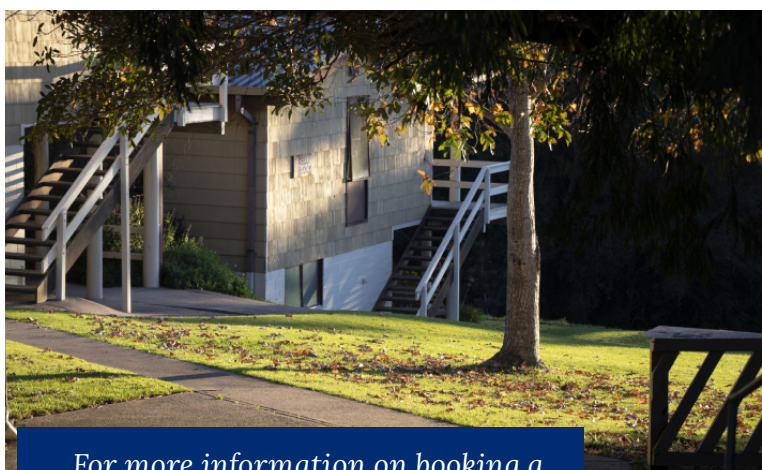
The Pines is located in Tuross Head which is south of Moruya and is able to accommodate up to 100 people at one time.
