



HEADMASTER'S REPORT

My Lord, Rev. Brother McGlade, Rt. Rev. Monsignor, Rev. Fathers, Rev. Sisters, Rev. Brothers, ladies and gentlemen.


I present to you the fourteenth annual report of St. Edmund's College. 1967 saw the retirement of His Grace Archbishop O'Brien and the appointment of His Grace Archbishop Cahill as his successor. The foundation of St. Edmund's almost coincided with the appointment of Archbishop O'Brien to the Archdiocese. Throughout the intervening years we enjoyed the friendship, guidance and genuine interest of His Grace. During these years he became a familiar figure at the College and its functions; I am sure the example of his own scholarly achievements will long prove an inspiration to the boys with whom he came in contact and he will be long remembered as a kindly, gracious and ever thoughtful pastor. We wish him long years of health and happiness in his retirement, to pursue those interests which the care of souls kept largely in the background.

To our new Archbishop, once again we offer a sincere welcome. We pledge our loyalty and cooperation in his work of administering this rapidly growing section of his Archdiocese.

Our Archbishop is undoubtedly a man of outstanding accomplishments and one who has already rendered great service to the Church as Bishop of Cairns, as member of the Secretariat for non-believers, as Secretary of the Liturgical Commission of the Australian Bishops' Conference and as a delegate to the Synod of Bishops now meeting in Rome. We pray that his work in this Archdiocese will be abundantly blessed.

We need no reminder that Catholic Education is today passing through a crisis - the problems of the Catholic school have been frequently aired in the daily press and in numerous periodicals - but we do need to be clear about the nature of the crisis. That there is a financial crisis there can be no doubt. The rapidly increasing cost of education to the community, the increased enrolment in Catholic schools which has outstripped the increase in Religious vocations, the increase in staff to allow expansion without overloading classes, reorganisation of secondary education and the consequent need to expand school facilities - all these have combined to bring us to the point of grave financial insecurity.

We are receiving considerable capital aid which has allowed expansion of the facilities the school provides and this we acknowledge gratefully.

However this does nothing to help with continually increasing running costs. The Government is fully aware of our situation and unless substantial aid is forthcoming in the very near future we will be forced regretfully to impose the largest ever increase in fees for 1968.

In the view of some people the crisis is not only a financial one. The validity of arguments for a Catholic school system is being called into question. It is sometimes claimed that the only distinguishing feature of the Catholic school is its daily Religious Instruction period. It is argued that the outlay of energy, finance and personnel is more than we can afford and that such resources could be more fruitfully applied in other fields of apostolic endeavour.

Every system of education aims to imprint a specific character on its students. The particular aims of the Catholic School are set out in the Declaration on Christian Education by the Vatican Council: "No less than other schools does the Catholic school pursue cultural goals and the natural development of youth. But it has several distinctive purposes. It aims to create for the school community an atmosphere enlivened by the gospel spirit of freedom and charity. It aims to help the adolescent in such a way that the development of his own personality will be matched by the growth of that new creation which he became by baptism. It strives to relate all human culture eventually to the news of salvation, so that the light of faith will illumine the knowledge which students gradually gain of the world, of life, and of mankind."

If the Church is to accomplish her mission in the world her members need to be motivated by a virile spirit of Faith and regard for others. No greater guarantee of virility can be given than ensuring that the mind of Christ permeates the activities of the adolescent, informing his intellect, forming his judgment, directing his will and sanctifying his actions.

Man is a composite being of spirit and matter and has needs peculiar to each of these worlds whose satisfaction is a matter of urgency in the life of each individual. Yet these needs are closely interwoven and interdependent. Undue emphasis on one set of needs to the neglect of the other produces a caricature of the human person. The fully formed man is one who, after long effort, has achieved a synthesis of his corporeal, affective, and spiritual powers and has thereby achieved true liberty. To the extent that man interiorizes the demands of duty, of vocation and directs his actions towards the Good from which they derive their meaning he has achieved integration and emerges free to give himself.



In the words of Vatican 11 the bishops "take the place of the Apostles as pastors of the Church, in such wise that who ever listens to them is listening to Christ".

We wish to welcome to Canberra our new pastor, this proven man who has taken over the ministry, Archbishop Thomas Cahill. We hope that the people of God in the Canberra Goulburn Archdiocese will profit spiritually having him for their leader and that he will find the fulfilling of his divinely given mission all the more pleasant for its being in this archdiocese.





Since education concerns itself with this twofold synthesis of cultural goals and the gospel spirit, and of the needs of the individual, it must be an integrated process. The desired end can hardly be achieved through fragmenting man's education. His religious formation must go hand in hand with the development of his bodily powers and with the informing of his intellect. Such cohesion can hardly be achieved by providing an education which most of the time concerns itself with the orderly development of the mind, and with training the individual in those basic skills which will enable him to survive in a highly competitive world. This is to relegate the development of the spirit to a separate and minimal amount of time and to a separate group of teachers. The true educator is essentially a leader who leaves his stamp on the student through a variety of contacts in several spheres of action.

In these days of extreme financial strain we can be tempted to yield to expediency and adopt a compromise which would destroy the effort and sacrifice of many generations. We have a heritage to pass on, not just to individuals of the present, but to countless generations to come. The sacrifice involved in maintaining our Catholic Schools is a constant witness to the relevance of the Gospel message to every aspect of human culture and learning.

Throughout the world there is a growing number of young people who have not come to grips with the realities of life; people who in spite of unprecedented affluence find within themselves a yearning which they have not the means of satisfying. It is unfortunate that because of their spectacular nature and because of the publicity they receive such groups exercise undue influence on the general community of young people who do not experience their problems and for whom their solutions are irrelevant.

Through the year we have attempted to provide an environment conducive to the full development of the boys. Y.C.S. groups and the St. Vincent de Paul Society function regularly within the timetable, while boys in junior classes are encouraged to become members of the Dominic Savio Club and the Crusaders of the Blessed Sacrament. We endeavour to bring the Liturgy into the everyday life of the school through weekly Mass, work is interspersed with prayer.

The physical development of the boys is catered for in a variety of sporting activities as well as in the weekly Physical education periods. Representative teams took part in cricket, football, tennis, basketball and hockey competitions and in swimming, athletic and cross-country carnivals. Within the school similar competition was provided on an inter-house basis. Coaching classes in swimming were provided throughout the year.

The College was particularly well represented in such cultural activities as the National Eisteddfod - both in choral and individual sections - interschool debates, the Lions' youth exchange programme, the Royal Commonwealth Society's Public Speaking competition, and the "Youth Speaks for Australia" contest.

In 1966 the last Leaving Certificate Examinations were held. 34 of the 38 who were repeating the Leaving year qualified for the Leaving Certificate. Noel Grieve, Dux of the College for 1966, shared the John Dean's prize for English.

Sixty eight of the Form IV class satisfied conditions for the award of the School Certificate.

This year the first group to follow completely the reorganised pattern of secondary education will sit for the first Higher School Certificate Examination. We wish them every success in the examinations and in their future careers.

In order to provide improved specialist facilities, staff rooms, and an enlarged library, the College buildings are to be extended. The work on extensions should commence in November and be ready for occupation in the second term next year. We are grateful to the Commonwealth Government for their assistance in approving this project as eligible for Capital Aid.

Much of the money raised two years ago to establish rowing in the school is being spent on equipment. We hope that our crews will begin training very soon.


I am proud to record that on Saturday, July 22nd our third past pupil was ordained to the priesthood. He is Father John Wells who attended the College from 1955 to 1960. Father Wells was guest of the school on the following Thursday, addressed the school assembly and celebrated Mass for present pupils of the College. We offer him our congratulations and wish him every blessing in his priestly work.

An event of great importance for the Christian Brothers in Australia was the visit of the Superior General, Br. A.A. Loftus, M.A. Ph.D. In a little over a hundred days, together with his vicar Brother C. Normoyle, he visited more than a hundred Christian Brothers' Schools throughout Australia and New Guinea. Br. Loftus visited the College on April 11th and addressed the School Assembly. He spoke enthusiastically of his experience in Australian schools and reminded the boys of the challenge they faced in an age when "no one can afford to be mediocre". He was impressed by the flourishing state of the Church in Australia and drew attention to the fact that other countries with a less developed system of Catholic Education did not exhibit the same strength of faith.



FROM THE COLLEGE CAPTAIN

The year 1967 has been one of continued advancement for St. Edmund's. The traditions of the past have been maintained and the foundations of new ones securely laid.

The College has attained an excellent academic record and this year has presented 74 students for the Higher School Certificate, most with matriculation courses. With the added difficulty of new Syllabuses the Brothers have been more than instrumental in moulding the students to take their places in society both academically and spiritually. They have by their inspiration given the boys the standards which are so essential in modern society. The student-teacher relationship is strong and the boys have reacted well to the opportunity to take responsibility for their study, occasioned by the extra year at school.

This strong relationship is characteristic not only of this level, but also on a pupil-pupil level. Senior pupils have volunteered to teach Christian Doctrine to the primary boys. I don't know who got the better of the experience, the "teachers" or the pupils, but the fact remains that the experience so gained will long be remembered. The result was that the two sections of the College became more strongly united. A variety of duties was undertaken by the prefects - ranging from school supervision to decoration of the hall for the school social.

Sport as in previous years, played a prominent role in the life of the pupils. The junior grades were especially successful in all their activities and the tradition established by the First XV and XI was well maintained. Swimming was extended into the winter months and the constant and specialised training will undoubtedly lead to handsome dividends. Athletics too figured notably in the school calendar, and the social contacts so made serve to strengthen our ties with neighbouring Colleges.

1967 has been a year of change, a year which has opened up new horizons. New activities such as "Quest" have been introduced and it is to be hoped that they will become firmly established as the College grows. Such things are only possible with the support of the students themselves and with this final point I would like sincerely to thank all the students and the prefects for their cooperation, and especially Brother Darmody and his staff, who have served as milestones in our lives. We are indebted to them, more than we can appreciate at the present time.







COLLEGE WINS MAP CONTEST

The Australian Institutes of Cartographers (A.C.T. Division) conducts each year a cartography competition. This year there were six sections. A prize was awarded for the best entry in each form of the Secondary division of the schools

The entrants had a wide choice. Three map subjects were given to choose from: The Common Market and the Rest of Europe, Northern Australia and South-Eastern Australia. Again, the students could select to make a model, in any medium, to illustrate some particular land form.

The local branch of the Institute awards prizes ranging from \$5 to \$10 to the winner in each form; the Readers Digest Association awards a copy of "The Readers Digest Great World Atlas", or "Atlas of the British Isles" to the prize winner in each section. In addition the Monaro Shopping Mall Merchants' Association awards a prize of a complete set of "The Times Atlas of the World" valued at \$100, or atlases and geographical reference books of an equivalent value, to the library of the school obtaining the highest number of points.

This competition arouses interest among the students of the college and many students, particularly among the students of Geography entered; they spent many hours drawing maps and creating models. The standard of work was high and four of the ten major prizes were awarded to the students of St. Edmund's College.







VOCATIONS

Br. A.A. Loftus, Superior General of the Christian Brothers, visited Australia this year. Below is an extract from an address he gave to the young men preparing to be Brothers at Strathfield.

"Let's never forget that the Catholic School is the foundation of the Catholic Church. Where the Catholic School flourishes, where the Brothers are working, the Church flourishes. Where you have no Catholic School, the Church is in a very poor condition. Last year we went out to South America. We went to Buenos Aires and there, as in many other places, the value of our vocation was brought home to me. In one place I visited there were over fifty thousand Catholics - five hundred go to Mass on Sundays, five hundred out of fifty thousand!! At first we were saying 'Oh, what is the matter with these South Americans?' But they have few Catholic schools and after all, you don't go to Church to learn your religion - you go because you have learnt it. Where there is no Catholic School, there is no practice of the faith.

About eleven years ago from the American Province we opened a Mission in the Carribean, a little island 50 miles long and 15 miles wide called Dominica. On this island when we went there first, once a boy was twelve years of age he never went to Church. Women went to Church, boys over twelve, no. Last summer we returned to the island and I mention it as a classic illustration of the value of our work, we found the graduates of the School married and with children were going to Mass, and their children were going to Mass. Five boys from the Island have become Brothers, three are out teaching now. In other words, there is a complete transformation - no practice of religion - wonderful practice of religion.

Now, you couldn't notice that in Australia because you have had the Catholic Schools for so long and it is just taken for granted. But it is going on here just as in any other place where the Brothers are doing this most important of works.

And that is why I would like to congratulate you young men who are preparing to enter the Congregation, and I remind you of the greatness of the work. And let us remember any time and every time, that we are not just teaching subjects; no one of us is teaching Mathematics or English or History. Never! We teach boys by means of English, History and Mathematics. The aim, the ideal, the aspiration of every Christian Brother is to bring every boy with whom he comes in contact just a little closer to the Lord. That's our work, and our work is hidden and humble and not spectacular, but so important.

That is why my Brothers and my Brothers-to-be don't forget the greatest claim to fame anyone of us can have that he's a Christian Brother".

The measure of success of a Catholic school is its ability to produce apostolic Christians. If a school succeeds in making of its pupils Christians who witness to their belief in Christ then, whatever else it does, it is a glorious success. And so it was an occasion for sincere thanks to God when we were able to welcome back to St. Edmund's an old-boy priest in July. Father John Wells, who did his Leaving Certificate at St. Edmund's in 1960 was ordained in his home town Queanbeyan on 22nd July. On the 27th he returned to his old school to offer Mass. The occasion was availed of to present Father with gifts from the boys and from the Old Boys' Association, a token of our pleasure at his ordination and of our good wishes for his life as God's Priest.

GEOGRAPHY EXCURSIONS

The Geography syllabus requires fieldwork, to the minimal extent of five full days in the two years, distributed in roughly equal proportions between physical and cultural aspects of geography.

The fulfillment of this requirement of the syllabus has proved very interesting and very enjoyable to the fifty sixth form geography students of 1967. They have learnt a lot of Geography in the field and consolidated quite a number of points made in the classroom. The old adage: "Geography is learnt through the sole of your boots" has been verified in their case.

The field days included a trip to Wollongong, a day on the summit of Australia, Mt. Kosciusko, a survey of the Fyshwick industrial area, a survey of the Kingston and Manuka Shopping areas, and a study of farms in the local area.

The departure for Port Kembla Steel Works was early - 6 a.m.; the route was via Goulburn, Moss Vale, Macquarie Pass, Albion Park and Dapto. Landforms, vegetation and farming features were pointed out on appropriate occasions.

The following extract from a letter to the Headmaster indicates the interest shown by the class at the Port Kembla Steel Works. It is signed by the General Manager, T.K. Duncan, for the Australian Iron and Steel Pty. Ltd., "We refer to the visit by 55 students from your school to our Plant on Wednesday, 23rd November. The behaviour of the group reflected what must be the guidance given by yourself and your staff. The most pleasing aspect of the visit, from our point of view, was the interest displayed by the students and their ready acceptance of the information and details of our complex operation."

The return was via Kiama and Cambewarra Lookout. The blowhole was visited and the delta of the Shoalhaven viewed from the Lookout.

The study of Urban Geography urged the study of the shopping centres. The type of and number of functions were noted and analysed; a spot survey of shoppers was made and it revealed a wide threshold of customers.

Included in the study of the forces of location and characteristics of Canberra's Industrial area was a case study of Cadona Dal and Company Joiners. Mr. Cadona and staff were most generous with their time and patient with the many queries. The industrial area was mapped as a result of the queries.


The trip to Mt. Kosciusko meant an early start also. The object was to study the effects of glaciation on the summit during the pleistocene times.




Relaxing on the felsenmeer atop summit Mt. Kosciusko. Photo, A. Taylor

The trip through the topographic corridor to Cooma was full of interest; a brief examination of Cooma, an old frontier town which has grown with the pace of an upstart mining town, because of the influx of workers employed by the Snowy Mountains Authority, but with much more order and convenience, proved interesting. The Kosciusko State Park Headquarters at Sawpit Creek revealed the many interesting features of the Park on their display boards and on a film. A State Ranger accompanied the party and pointed out many geomorphological features and helped to understand the geomorphology of the area. The summit was reached by all the members of the party after a study of the glacial characteristics of the summit area.

The final excursion was made in an endeavour to see if Canberra was exerting an influence on the farms in the local area. The first farm was a dairy farm at Fyshwick. Mr. Kelly, the owner of this Ayrshire Stud, pointed out the features of the farm and answered the queries. The second farm was the sheep and stud property of Sir Walter Merriman at "Hill View" Murrumbateman. The Stud Master, Mr. Hardy showed the party over this part of the property and the Manager, Mr. K. Bush the sheep section. Time did not permit a very long stay at Mr. K.A. Darmody's property at Sutton. The geographic features along the routes were noted; and the services of the hamlets and villages were observed. Another bush field day and the final one for this year's class.







This movement is rousing the charity dormant in the heart of youth and please God will go from strength to strength.











CROSS COUNTRY

If a boy has plenty of heart, strong reserves of stamina, and a little speed, he can be a successful cross-country runner. We have had a few boys in our teams who were good sprinters also, but most of our champions have been lightly-built boys, with determination rather than high speed.

The competition is unusual in two ways. Firstly, the scoring is arranged so that the winner gains 20 points, the second place-getter gains 18 points, the third gains 17 points, and so on, until the 19th runner is given one point. This means that almost every competitor can help his team to win, and a consistent team of five runners can do better than one outstanding runner, with the rest of the team of poor standard. Secondly, since the course is different each year, over different types of country, there are no records, as there are in track events, although the best times are fairly consistent from year to year.

In spite of the strenuous training involved, our boys have enjoyed their running, and they have deserved the satisfaction they have received from their successes. Since the A.S.C. competition began in 1959, St. Edmund's has won five times - in 1962, '63 and for the last three years, 1965, '66, '67. The quality of the youngest members of this year's team indicates that we are going to be stronger than ever in the next few years.

An unusual feature of our teams has been the number of successful family groups. This year, we had two sets of twins - Joseph and Francis Ravanello in the Under 16 division, and Paul and Anthony Weiss in the Under 13 division. Other pairs of brothers over the last few years have been Michael and Philip Skipper, Stephen and Gavin Bourke, Brendan and Denis Wilson, Christopher and Dominic Hawke.
