





#### **CENTENARY**

IT IS JUST ONE HUNDRED YEARS since the Christian Brothers became associated permanently with the Catholic Education of boys in Australia. On November 15th 1868 four pioneer Brothers headed by Brother Patrick Ambrose Treacy disembarked from the Donald McKie in Melbourne.

With firm faith and remarkable courage but no material resources whatever - they borrowed ten shillings from a fellow passenger to get to the Bishop's house - they began the task of establishing the Congregation of Christian Brothers in Australia. Following their opening at Victoria Parade in East Melbourne the pioneers travelled distances forbidding in those times to begin schools in Brisbane (1874), Dunedin (1876), Adelaide (1879), Sydney (1887), Rockhampton and Perth (1893).

Today as a result of this courageous beginning there are some 1200 Brothers teaching in more than 120 schools with a total enrolment of 50,000 boys. As we rejoice today in 100 years of fruitful effort, we remember with gratitude and admiration the work of the pioneer Brothers and give thanks to God under whose grace and guidance the work has prospered. The developments of the last hundred years stand as a monument to the sacrifice of past generations of Catholic parents throughout this country. In these days of financial crisis in our schools we can find inspiration, if not consolation, in the magnificent contribution of the pioneers and those who followed them.

Plans are in hand for the commemoration of the Centenary during the weekend of Nov 23rd - 24th.

The programme will consist of

- a reunion for ex-students of all Christian Brothers' Schools in Australia on Nov 23rd.
- a dinner for parents, friends and ex-students on Nov 24th.
- a public Mass to be celebrated on Nov 24th.

#### ASPECTS OF OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

With some minor modifications and revisions the revised pattern of secondary education in N.S.W. and the A.C.T. is substantially what was envisaged at its inception seven years ago. The system has now run a full cycle and while it is too early to evaluate it fully some patterns in the background against which it operates are discernible. The policy of a broad general education for all together with preparation for tertiary study has been forced to contend with pressures from within society which do not form part of the system as planned.

Traditionally our educational goals have been in many respects modified by and even identified with achievement in public examinations. Competition for places within faculties at the University and other institutions, for Commonwealth Scholarships and even for matriculation has tended to place undue pressure on students to pass examinations at a level not always appropriate.

It is not my intention to decry public examinations. They do form a useful basis for evaluation of one aspect of education and often provide the necessary incentive for industry in the task of learning. However, undue pre-occupation with the domain of cognition - the only area capable of reliable scrutiny in a public examination - can militate against the best interests of students if affective and creative dimensions are thereby neglected.

The Leaving Certificate system provided an outlet for our pre-occupation with clearing a hurdle. Four subject passes qualified the candidate for a "pass in the Leaving." Today under the policy of no "pass requirement" for the Higher School Certificate undue emphasis is placed on Matriculation which is now the only convenient label.


The division of syllabuses into distinct courses provides the student with the opportunity of personal development appropriate to his ability. The full development of even one talent can lead to a satisfying life and is recognised in the Gospel parable as deserving a reward. By all means let us urge students to develop to their full capacity, but we should be slow to insist on inappropriate goals which lead to frustration and failure to achieve even realistic aims.

I have spoken of this danger on previous occasions but, I believe, until we instil more realism into the aims of students their best interests cannot be served by any system of education. A commendable effort to examine means of breaking the nexus between secondary school achievement and matriculation was undertaken by the A.N.U. this year. Through this project we may yet see the development of a yardstick for measuring suitability for tertiary study without sole reference to achievement at the cognitive level, sometimes through overlearning.

The Leaving Certificate also provided a blanket requirement for employment. With the passing of this system there is now no overall requirement which can be simply stated by employers. The Higher School Certificate is awarded if only one subject is passed at any level and is therefore not specific enough for employment requirements. Matriculation is too demanding for this purpose since it is unrealistic to expect the relatively small number who qualify for University Entrance to cover all avenues of employment. Unless students have decided on their future careers when selecting subjects and levels in Form V they may tend to select Matriculation courses to keep as many avenues as possible open. In so doing many are aiming too high.


The establishment of Colleges of Advanced Education should provide a much needed alternative to University provided they cater for a wide range of abilities. If these Colleges are to enjoy parity with Universities and if degrees are not to be devalued they will cater for a limited range of abilities at the upper end of the spectrum. The majority in the middle range who form the bulk of the work force in administration and technology will be denied valuable training or will be forced to aim inappropriately.





It is important that as many as possible be prepared to function adequately in a role of service to the community to their own satisfaction and personal development. There is an urgent need for the establishment of Courses catering for the upper middle range of abilities which ought to be recognised by industry and commerce and which will reduce the wastage we now experience in Universities.

#### THE SCHOOL

As in previous years we have attempted to provide an environment conducive to the religious, cultural, academic, physical and social development of the boys of St. Edmund's. We have been ably represented in cultural, academic and sporting fields and have enjoyed our successes. On the other hand there have been disappointments. The brilliant in any sphere of endeavour will do well given a reasonable climate. The majority work away without spectacular achievement or notoriety. One can only hope that the future will show that the ground has been prepared for competence and responsibility in adult life.

I offer my sincere thanks to all who have assisted in this task in any way - the Archbishop for his visits, his interest and his pastoral care, the staff for their conscientious performance of duty and their patience, parents for their assistance, ready co-operation and sacrifice and the boys for their enthusiasm, hard work and interest in all that concerns the school. We have been blessed in the appointment of Father Power, himself an ex-student of the school, as College Chaplain. He has been responsible for weekly Mass and has been of great assistance in being available to the boys for confession and guidance.

To the College Captain, Timothy Moy, I offer my congratulations and thanks. His devotion to the school of which he has been a member for nine years could not be questioned. Ably assisted by the Vice Captain, Gavin Schmedje and a competent band of prefects he has done much to foster the family spirit of the school community.

To our departing Sixth Formers, who commence examinations next Wednesday I wish every success not only immediately but in the years ahead. I have been impressed by the evidence of sound maturity and good sense they displayed throughout the year.

Our hard working and enthusiastic Parents and Friends Auxiliary has always been available when required and through working bees, tuck days, cake stalls, typing and sewing has assisted in the functioning of the school and provided valuable equipment.

#### **VOCATIONS**

A matter of great concern is the lack of numbers from amongst our students proceeding to the Seminary and our Novitiate. In this rapidly expanding community a steady flow of Priests and Brothers will be necessary to maintain the work of the Church. St. Edmund's must be a source of such

vocations. Families ought to be proud to foster the signs of vocation amongst their members. Family prayer that a son will be guided to dedicate his life to Christ in the Church ought to be encouraged. Two past pupils of the 1965 Leaving Class - Brian Kimball and Denis Wilson - were selected this year to continue their studies for the Priesthood in Rome. I congratulate them and their parents on this honour and wish them well in their studies.

#### APOSTOLIC GROUPS

The St. Vincent de Paul Junior Conference and the Y.C.S. groups have met regularly throughout the year. Each in its own way emphasises in a practical form the outgoing nature of the mission of Catholics, and provides a means of coming to grips with problems that exist near to home and in less favoured regions of the world. The St. Vincent de Paul conference has assisted the Senior conference in a number of works.

The Y.C.S. groups have so far been limited to discussions but have plans for a broader range of activities for the coming year.

#### SPORTING ACTIVITIES

Our boys have taken part in the usual wide range of sporting activities in addition to the regular physical education course within the curriculum. Our representatives took part in Cricket, Swimming, Rowing, Basketball, Tennis, Football, Hockey, Cross Country and Athletics with varying degrees of success but always with enthusiasm.

A rowing committee formed early this year has worked efficiently during our first full rowing season. A wine and cheese tasting evening arranged by the committee was an undoubted social as well as financial success.


#### **BUILDING EXTENSIONS**

Through additions completed this year by means of Government Capital aid, we now enjoy facilities previously beyond our means. The additions comprise library suite, geography room, language room, art room and staff rooms. The cost of this extension was \$300,000. Further additions soon to be commenced consist of an assembly hall with woodwork room and change rooms. The equipping of the library and specialist rooms suitably will be a continuing project.

#### **FINANCE**

Financial assistance granted by the Commonwealth Government in November 1967 and increased this year has enabled us to function without an increase in fees. The grant has not solved all our financial problems but did help to avert the crisis we were facing at the end of 1967. We look forward to increasing Commonwealth involvement as running costs increase year by year.

The library is gradually being accorded its rightful place as the focus of learning within schools. Our students of today will depend more on their ability to take the initiative in seeking new knowledge than on their ability to



recall and use facts and skills learned while at school. Thus it is urgent that they develop competence in working with books. Obviously this can be done only by their introduction to a well equipped and well stocked library as soon as possible.

I therefore welcome the Government decision to grant capital aid for the erection and stocking of school libraries.

#### CONCLUSION

There is no sure way of assessing the degree of success we have achieved in our efforts during the year. In the short term we can appeal to statistics in scholastic achievement, and in competition in cultural and sporting fields. In the long term we must await the developments of the future to prove how deep and lasting have been the results of our efforts. I thank one and all for their support and encouragement.


#### REV, BR, W.V. GREEN

When Brother Green came to Canberra in 1967 to spend the twilight of his busy life in part-time teaching, he found it difficult to inspire his young pupils with the same spirit of study that he had instilled into so many hundreds, if not thousands, of boys in other schools. Canberra boys knew nothing of his record as a close and successful teacher or of his able administration of schools such as Aquinas, Waverley, Lewisham, and St. Patrick's, Goulburn.

Few of Brother Green's students in Canberra could imagine him as the dynamic Headmaster of one of the most celebrated Great Public Schools in this country. But twenty years ago, the great Nudgee College was not only a legend in sport, but it enjoyed a golden era of scholastic success. In the "Green years", Nudgee won first place in the Junior Public Examination (the equivalent of our School Certificate) for three consecutive years, and in the Senior Examination (the equivalent of our Higher School Certificate) it capped a consistent record of high places by taking both first and second places - an unheard-of feat for any school.

But it is characteristic of young people to think more of the present than of the glorious past, and so Brother Green had to summon all his reserves of skill and patience to help his pupils to make steady progress. Those of us who had known him for a long time realised that his success came, not from sheer brilliance, but from steady hard work and unremitting persistence. The Brothers always found him a pleasant and witty companion, easy to get on with and full of genuine sympathy.


The stroke that immobilised him came when he was apparently enjoying good health. It seemed characteristic that he was struck down while in the act of preparing his lessons for the following day. No doubt, thousands of his ex-pupils all over Australia will join us in hoping that he will be able to spend his last days of life free from pain and care, before he is called away to receive his well-deserved reward for a lifetime of "instructing many unto justice".

#### FROM THE COLLEGE CAPTAIN

IN THE COLLEGE'S relatively short history, there have been years aptly described as years of advancement. The year 1968 ranks as the new high point in the College's progress, not just because it has been the latesr year through which we have passed, but because it has been an exceptional year of growth and challenge, as well as of consolidation.

Consolidation has occurred in the College's academic traditions. This year, 59 students have prepared for the Higher School Certificate Exams and as happened last year, the majority are on matriculation courses. Being the second senior class to complete the Wyndham Scheme and its new syllabuses, Sixth Form can look forward to the January results as surely more than matching those of last year: their confidence should be in part derived from the dedication of their teachers who have an extra quota of experience with the new work to enhance the firm grasp of the Wyndham Scheme which they exhibited last year.

Consolidation also occurred in our sporting traditions. The First XI and Firts XV had mixed success in their respective seasons, but nonetheless upheld a great tradition of the College, the tradition of sportsmanship. Once again the junior grades did particularly well, and the hockey teams of 1968 maintained the excellent reputations of the past teams.

School sport also saw growth. St. Edmund's did very well in the newest sport that we have taken up again, after a lapse: rowing. It seems possible that in the future rowing may be the sport through which the College will gain the majority of its sporting honours. Certainly, interest and enthusiasm point that way.

Extensions to the College during the year have meant growth for St. Edmund's. Sixth Formers have been prompted to a certain envy, because they will not get to use fully the new classrooms, library, language laboratory, geography room, sports room - and medical room as well. The new watering system, the installation of which made the grounds a bit hard this year, will ensure that in the future the only thing concrete about the playing fields will be the cricket pitches. Another aspect of change in the College has been the change in uniform: this year, senior students had the option of wearing a suit coat or blazer.

I conclude with some well deserved "thank-you's": to the boys, on behalf of the prefects, for helping in various small ways to make their job a bit easier; to the parents and friends of the college, on behalf of all students, for their interest and support during the year; and on behalf of Sixth Form, to the Brothers and teachers, past and particularly present, for whom I hope we did not create too many dilemmas, and whose dedication, in preparing us for modern life, we now appreciate and are more than grateful for.


Yet we should not be so pessimistic. If the dangers are greater, the opportunities are greater as well. Once young people realize their potential there is almost no limit to the good they can achieve in society generally and in the Church. Just at the time when we see young people becoming more prominent in the world, the layman in the Church is being emphasised. The great achievement of the 2nd Vatican Council was to point out to lay people their active role in the Church.

Realizing the influence of young people, the bishops at the Vatican Council appealed especially to them to recognize and live up to their role in the Church. What does all this mean for boys at St Edmund's? The College motto, "Christ is my light" means bringing Christ into your own personal life. But it means more than this. Christ told us "I am the light of the world". It is through the Church, that is, through you and me that the light of Christ is spread throughout the world.

There might not be much that you can do about the war in Vietnam or about poverty in India. But what about your school-mates, the members of your family, your friends in the neighbourhood? Do you always see their needs and your responsibilities towards them? If you do not, then you are not bringing Christ to your world, you are failing in your *duty* to be an apostle.

Father Andrew Greeley, an American priest, sees youth's two great assets as generosity and enthusiasm. These qualities are certainly not lacking in you pupils of St Edmund's College. Please God, you will always use them in the right direction and to the best advantage. May God bless you.

#### YOUNG CHRISTIAN STUDENTS

The Young Christian Students Movement is the corresponding school society to the Young Christian Workers Movement which caters for those who have left school. It is naturally hoped that those who see fit to join the Y.C.S. at school would graduate to the senior group upon leaving school. However, this is not a pre-requisite for membership in the school group.

The movement has been in existence for a good many years but its work has taken on a new dimension in the light of the recent Vatican Council. It is particularly relevant in the light of the following excerpt from the Laity Decree (Para. 12):

"Young persons should become the first to carry on the apostolate directly to other young persons, concentrating their apostolic efforts within their own circle, according to the needs of the social environment in which they live."

Discussion naturally forms a part of the activity of the group, but it is hoped in the near future to extend activities to embrace so far untouched areas of school life. The movement hopes to sponsor various groups devoted to boys who have common interests but so far have no means of expressing these interests in common. Perhaps by the time this article goes to press these groups will have got under way. All who have any interests in such activities are invited to join, but the joining of such groups does not mean that you have to be a member of the Y.C.S. However, as boys progress into the senior classes they are invited to give serious consideration to such membership and so help in the development of a society that will be useful spiritually to themselves and the school.

#### ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul in Canberra is a large organization; it has over 160 members. In some parishes, however, the members cannot cope with the work. With this problem in mind and with an eye to the future a Junior Conference was established at St. Edmund's in 1967.

The pioneer executive carried on the organization of the Conference until August of this year. At this time Chris Hawke became President, Robert McInnes, Secretary and John Della Vedova, Treasurer. The new executive has entered into the work of guiding and leading the Conference with commendable enthusiasm.

Conference held their appeal for used clothing in the early weeks of the third term. The response was very pleasing. A large bundle of clothing was delivered to the Narrabundah Shelter. Yes, the families of the students were pleased to have had the opportunity to help the needy of the city and to contribute to the funds of the Society. The help sought at home and abroad is a constant drain on the finance of the Society. For instance, the new "shelter" at Turner will extend the work of the Society: the accommodation will cater for many more than at present, and the assistance will be extended in time and in depth. This courageous venture will cost the Society \$50,000 and will increase the demands on the time and energies of the members.

The Junior Conference members have engaged in the routine charitable work of the Society. They have been delighted at the warmth of welcome given them at Festival Meetings. The bi-weekly visits of senior members to their meetings are very much appreciated. The visit of Mons. Weisell, Diocesan Spiritual Director of the Society, and that of Fr. T. Wright, Chaplain to the South Side Particular Council were of considerable help and inspiration to the "fledglings" of this Society.

Members have organized the monthly presentation over the public address system of the General and Mission Intentions of the Apostleship of Prayer. They have also distributed Catholic magazines and Catholic Truth Society publications among their fellow students.

The Junior Conference provides an apportunity for the senior students to practice Christian charity - a practice that should deepen their spirituality and help them to mature socially. "As long as you did it to one of these the least of my brethren you did it to Me", is the inspiration of the members.

### **One Hundred Years**

"AS FOR MONEY," said the Bishop, "I haven't a rap." Br. Treacy had less. He was ten shillings in debt. He had just landed, penniless, from Ireland with Australia's first three Christian Brothers, and had borrowed ten shillings from a fellow passenger to transport them and their luggage to this interview with Bishop Gould of Melbourne.


"Throw yourselves on the people," said the Bishop cheerfully. "They will provide."

Thus the work began. On a non-existent rap, a ten shilling debt and an Irishman's faith. It was 1868. The Christian Brothers' pupils in Australia that year numbered 73. Today there are 50,000. Clearly the hand of God is here, and just as clearly, the labour of men. And of one man in particular - Br. Patrick Ambrose Treacy, the founder of the Christian Brothers in Australia.

If that interview with his lordship had in any way lowered his spirits or shaken his faith, it was not apparent. He went straight to work. And if he found the heat of the Australian summer almost beyond endurance, he never showed it. He just travelled on, in his black suit, with his ink bottle and pen and his blank cheque forms, on horseback or foot, through the miners' camps, the outback, the city streets, in search of the people who would "provide". And if he found those endless journeys across the vast spaces of this new land incredibly trying, again he never showed it. In fact the country didn't seem big enough for him. In the next few years he had started schools in places as far flung as Dunedin, Rockhampton and Perth.

In 1897 he made his appearance on the Southern Tablelands to take over St. Patrick's College, Goulburn. The late Fr. Hartigan (John O'Brien) was a pupil there at the time and here are his recollections.

"I remember the day in 1897 that Brother Treacy, the Superior of the Christian Brothers, came to take over. He had a firm chin and a solemn expression, but the chin seemed to grow firmer and the face more solemn as bit by bit he discovered what he had. He reminded me of a man who had bought a horse at a sale, but on getting him home found he was blind in both eyes and lame in every leg. I can remember him as he walked around with his hands behind his back and examined what had come to him - the shabby, ink-stained walls, the ceilings clustered with darts made of pens and paper, the desks covered with names that didn't matter then and have not been heard of since, the windows broken where stones had come through - some of them by accident, some by well directed shots and malice aforethought - the

spouts plugged up with discarded hats, and the couple of dozen nondescript human beings inaccurately described in the catalogue as 'students', mooning around, doing time 'with the fruitless years behind them and the hopeless years before them'. Yes I can see that brave old Brother, with his knowledge of methods and ideals, viewing the wreck and shaking his head reflecting, 'These be thy gods, Oh Israel'."


But he salvaged the wreck and moved on. By 1903 he had established 30 schools throughout the continent. They are flourishing still - an enduring tribute to the man who founded them. A man with an extraordinary calling, who laboured with a devotion of which one is ordinarily incapable and whose achievements for Catholic education in Australia will never be fully estimated. Yet a man subject, like the rest of us, to loneliness and homesickness, to weariness, depression and doubt. The force that sustained him was his strong, unwavering faith. And this is his legacy to us who are concerned with Catholic education in the new century opening before us.

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





The humorous character of the song was well done. Words were clear. Tempo variations sounded natural and were well done. Well presented. 88 marks. First.

Captured the humorous feeling of the song quite well. Fair diction and good rhythm. Voices were quite well matched for this song. Well presented. 85 marks. Second.

#### Vocal Solo, Under 10. Peter Landy.


Bright and pleasant musical presentation. Words were quite clear. The rhythm of the song was given good expression. Good understanding. 88 marks. Second.


... 17 First Eleven drew with Grammar. Under 11's have another win. That boy Percy seems to be doing a lot.

### **Parents and Friends**


1968 HAS BEEN A BUSY and successful year for the Auxiliary and its Executive.

# Sport





#### FROM THE SPORTSMASTER

SPORT WAS ONCE REGARDED as a form of pleasant diversion, but now it is recognised as an essential part of healthy living. The U.S. President's Council on Physical Fitness declared in 1964: "We can no longer afford to consider anyone fully educated until he knows how - and is thoroughly motivated - to keep himself in the best possible physical condition at all times."

President Johnson had personal experience of the importance of sport in education. His own account runs: "In my first experience as a schoolteacher, serving as principal of a small school at Cotulla, Texas, I learned by first-hand observation a fact now well established by thorough research: that mental fitness begins with physical fitness in our children. Faced in the school room with laggard minds, to which learning came slowly, if at all, I took my first pay-cheque to buy a volleyball and net for the playground use of the pupils I was teaching - or trying to teach. I shall never forget the change that was brought into the classroom from the playground after those sessions of organised physical activity began. From that day forward, teaching had a chance, and the children themselves had a far better chance in life."

Psychiatrists assure us that people need sport to meet deep-seated psychological demands. In the "good old days", aggressiveness could be diverted into pioneering and exploring. Now, we need sport for emotional adjustment. Games, they say, resemble life in capsule form, and the participant quickly learns that his performance depends upon the development of strength, stamina, self-discipline, and a sure and steady judgment.

Most healthy boys just like sport, without theorising on the benefits they should be deriving from the games they play. We have a disappointingly large number of non-participants in every season of the year. There are good reasons for not playing in a few instances, but the majority of those who do not take part are either apathetic or emotionally unhealthy.

Some of the happiest times we teachers have are with teams of boys who may not be very skilful but who want to play together. They extract an immense amount of enjoyment from their games, and probably without fully realising what they are doing, they spread about them a spirit of joy and contentment.

The school should be the natural centre of a schoolboy's activity in sport. It is sometimes disappointing to see boys refusing to join their school companions in playing with a team associated with the school. Apart from some quite extraordinary circumstances, one would expect that any loyal and healthy member of a school would offer his services willingly. Many boys do, but there are too many who seem reluctant to have any connection with their Alma Mater apart from the compulsory legal attendance.

A final word from President Johnson: "Today it is a delusion for any community to regard the playground as a luxury and the classroom as the only essential. Play - planned, supervised and properly equipped - is as essential to the development of the young as study. Fitness of body is

indispensable for fitness of mind."





In the A.S.C. Carnival we gained third place, only 27 points behind St. Patrick's. This was an improvement on last year when we gained the same place but were 88 points behind.


